Westend61/Getty Images Learning to draw coordinates on a grid often starts in fifth or sixth grade and increases the level of difficulty to high school and beyond. The grid contains an x axis and an axis and are really two perpendicular lines. A trick to remember this (and yes, many students often forget that's what) is to think about y as the longest letter therefore will always be the vertical line on the axis. x is the horizontal line of the axis. However, if you have a different trick to remember the x and y axis, use what works for you. The point where the x-axis and the intersection of the y axis is known as the origin. You'll also see grids referred to as cartesian coordinates. The numbers for the trace points are indicated as (3,4) or (2,2) etc. The first number means you will start the x axis and move that many through, the second number is the number of the y axis. So, for the tidy pair (3,5) I would go through 3 and up to five. There are actually four quadrants on the grid when 0 is the center of the net. This allows the layout of positive and negative integers. Negative integers will fall to the left of the axis from where the two perpendicular lines cross and also fall below the perpendicular lines intersected on the y axis. This is just a brief overview of how the Cartesian grid works, or plotting lines in coordinate worksheets. With some practice, you will understand the concept in a short time. In this video, the artist Minnie Small breaks down the foundations of the gouache.
